#### **Whole School Approach:**

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We have internal processes for monitoring quality of provision and assessment of need. Our whole school approach involves quality first teaching and additional interventions, which are implemented according to identified need. These procedures help us to regularly review and record what we offer EVERY child or young person in our care and what we offer additionally. Whole school and phase discussions serve to embed our high expectations among staff about quality teaching and the application of a differentiated and personalised approach to teaching and learning. We make it a point to discuss aspirations with ALL our learners.

Underpinning ALL our provision in school is the **graduated approach** cycle of:



All teachers are responsible for every child in their care, including those with special educational needs (**Reference:** Owlsmoor Primary School SEND Policy 2022/23).

**Assess:** Using formative assessment tools (such as relevant maths or reading tests), and consultation with parents and the pupil themselves, a detailed picture of the pupil's needs is developed. This may be undertaken by class teachers, teaching assistants or specialists depending on the nature of the assessment required.

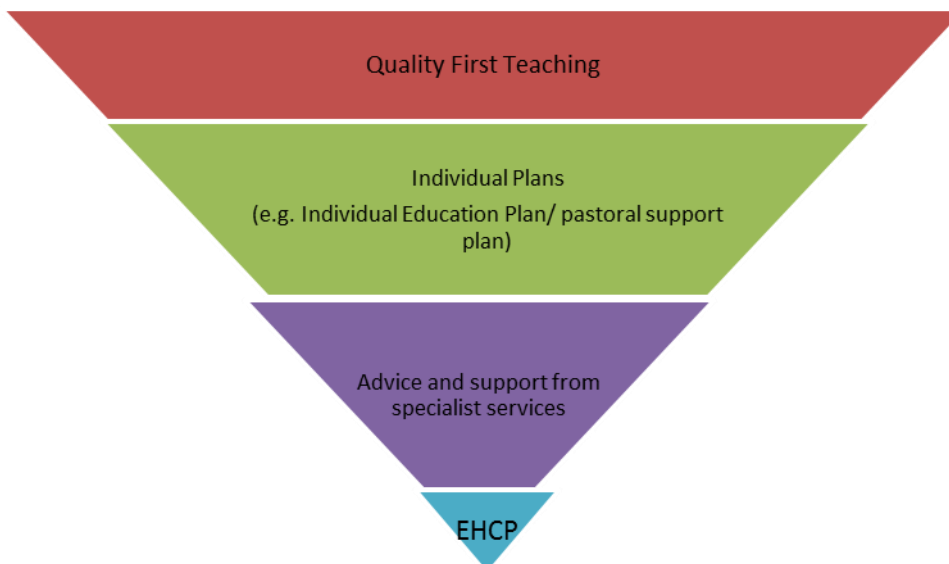
**Plan:** An Individualised Education Plan (IEP) document will be drawn up by the pupil's teacher in consultation with parents or carers, describing the additional personalised support that will be provided. The school may consult with outside agencies at this stage, such as Educational Psychologist (EP), Speech and Language Service (SALT), Occupational Therapy Service (OT), Children and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS), Autism Service (AS), Support for Learning Service (SfL), or Behaviour Support Team (BST).

**Do:** Teachers and teaching assistants will ensure that the IEP is followed. The pupil's needs may be met through additional modifications to the class teaching, provision of specialist resources, or by inclusion in additional small group or individual support lessons. Parents and carers will receive advice about how to support their child at home.

Outside agencies are able to work alongside the pupil, parents and teachers to offer advice about meeting the pupil's SEND, and this advice will be reflected in the child's IEP in the form of learning targets and provision/strategies.

**Review:** IEPs are reviewed in writing at least once a term by the class teacher, or more frequently in most cases, and the provision that is being made is adapted in light of that review. The review will include consultation between parents, pupils, and teachers. The SENDCo will be involved for learners experiencing a high level of need, or who have needs in several areas of the four main areas outlined in the Code of Practice. The review process then feeds back into more assessment, and the cycle of assess, plan, do, and review is repeated.

The tools we use are summarised below.



**Quality First Teaching:** Supported by provision mapping - a summary document completed by teachers which details all the provision for vulnerable groups in each class – and planning which details all the next steps in learning that will be taught in differentiated class groups over the course of a term.

**Individual Plans:** Learning Pathway, Pastoral Support Plan or Behaviour Support Plan: This is a document containing a detailed action plan listing the goals and provision to meet individual Special Educational Needs. This is provision which is additional to or different from quality first teaching and may be supported by specialist advice.

**Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP):** Where the school has done everything it can to identify, assess and meet the SEND of the child and he/she is still not making the expected progress, the school or parents may consider requesting an Education, Health and Care assessment. Education Health and Care Plans are issued by the Local Authority where necessary and are used by the school to plan SEND provision for children with severe and complex needs. The EHCP includes:

- a detailed profile of the child, their strengths and aspirations for the future
- any education, health and care needs they have
- the goals or outcomes for the pupil agreed by the family and professionals for the next phase of their education
- any education, health and social care provision in place to meet their needs

### SEND Needs:

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Owlsmoor is a mainstream primary school and welcomes all children including those with SEND in one or more of the following four commonly recognised broad areas of need and support:

1. Communication and interaction (e.g. speech, language and communication needs (SLCN), Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Asperger’s Syndrome )
  - From entering school in Reception, the school aims to quickly identify any speech and language needs early and arrange for additional support in the classroom, by a key adult, or

*in small groups.*

- *The school is supported by Speech and Language therapy service for children with a high level of needs; they make regular visits to the school as part of the Assess, Plan, Do, Review cycle.*
  - *Children with a diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Disorder may be supported by advice from the mainstream support service provided by Autism Support (AS)*
2. Cognition and learning (e.g. Specific learning difficulties (SpLD), global developmental delay, dyslexia, dyscalculia and dyspraxia)
- *Owlsmoor provides additional small group or 1:1 teaching to support Maths and English using various resource programmes such as: Beat dyslexia, Five minute, precision teaching, pegs to paper and Head start.*
  - *The school can also access teaching support from the SfL (Support for Learning Service) who can provide specialist teachers to work with groups and individuals according to identified needs. Additional supporting advice is accessed from the Educational Psychology Service as necessary.*
3. Social, emotional and mental health (e.g. attention deficit hyperactive disorder (ADHD), depression, eating disorders, attachment disorder)
- *Owlsmoor has 2 Family Support Advisers (FSA) who are available for direct work or signposting for children and families who are experiencing social, emotional and mental health difficulties.*
  - *The school has two Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA) who can be available to support individual children at key times, or to offer support more widely through group work. e.g. within the Nest Lunchtime provision, well-being groups, pet therapy, Lego therapy or outside enrichment.*
  - *The school's behaviour management system focuses on the rights and responsibilities of the child which encourages children to make sensible choices and reflect on their less sensible choices.*
  - *The school accesses support from the SEMH and Inclusion Team, the Early Help Team, Educational Psychologist, Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) and Autism Support (AS) to create bespoke support plans for individuals or groups.*
  - *The school has a Breaktime Group and a Lunchtime Club for invited vulnerable pupils who need respite from the busy activity of the main playground.*
  - *The school runs a weekly outdoor enrichment session for Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 for small groups of pupils who need alternative provision away from their usual classroom.*
4. Sensory and/or physical needs (e.g. vision impairment (VI), hearing impairment (HI), or Cerebral Palsy (CP), epilepsy )
- *It is the school's aim and intention to fully comply with current legislation and good practice. We wish to make our premises as accessible as possible, in line with local planning policy and the obligations imposed as service providers under the Equality Act of 2010.*

- *The school makes reasonable adjustments to ensure that children with sensory and/or physical needs are not disadvantaged. We take advice from the Sensory Consortium, Support for Learning, Occupational Therapy and Educational Psychologist as necessary to meet individual needs.*
- *The school runs weekly gross motor skills sessions, led by a PE specialist, for pupils with additional physical needs.*
- *An individual care plan may be produced in consultation with parents and children for children with identified medical needs or conditions.*

We have internal processes for monitoring quality of provision and assessment of need. These include:

- Regular pupil progress meetings to ensure good quality first teaching and accountability regarding pupil progress towards targets.
- Evaluations of provision and interventions with baseline and exit data to measure progress made, where appropriate.
- The Senior Leadership Team and SENDCo (Mrs Sneddon) are responsible for the performance management of SEND teaching assistants who all receive lesson observations and feedback.
- The SEND Team advise on IEPs and provision ensuring class teachers and teaching assistants are informed and can access the resources and information their pupils need.
- The SEND team regularly meet with parents to discuss pupil needs and progress.

### **Consulting with children, young people and their parents**

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Involving parents and learners in the dialogue is central to our approach and we do this through:

Action/Event	Who's involved	Frequency
Open door policy.	Class teacher in the first instance.  SENDCo and/or FSA if required.	As and when required by appointment, during term time.
Consultation meetings (parents' evening).	Class teacher, parent and pupils.  SENDCo and/or FSA if required.	Termly.
Review of Individual Education Plans.	Class teacher, parent and young person (overseen by SENDCo).  SENDCo and/or FSA if required.	October, January, March, June (or more frequently if needed).
EHCP reviews.	SENDCo, class teacher, parent, pupil, relevant support and pastoral staff, and other relevant external professionals	Annually (Reviews can be called early or an emergency if necessary).

## **Staff development**

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All staff receive regular training. Training for staff relates to the needs of the school and pupils and is done both in school and through external course providers or local authority agencies such as Speech and Language therapists. Our Teaching Assistants receive training in areas relevant to their role. This includes learning difficulties, autistic spectrum disorders, attention deficit and hyperactivity difficulties, motor skills, and interventions in reading, phonics, writing and maths.

## **Staff deployment**

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Considerable thought, planning and preparations goes into utilising our support staff to ensure children achieve the best outcomes, gain independence and are prepared for the next stage of their education.

All classes have support from teaching assistants to work alongside the class teacher with different groups within the class according to the class teacher's differentiated planning.

The SENDCo is without a class responsibility, to allow for efficient planning, monitoring and management of the team and resources to ensure that all pupils with SEND make progress.

## **School Partnerships and Transitions**

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Our academic assessment for children and young people with special educational needs is moderated through our own teaching staff, our cluster of schools and the local authority.

We work with our feeder schools and families to welcome children and young people with special educational needs or disabilities and we support children and young people to make a successful transition to the next phase in education.

We liaise closely with staff from secondary schools for KS2 transition in Year 6, and the final Summer Term in Year 6 has school visits for pupils and families to enable a smooth transition. When necessary, Owlsmoor staff are able to visit secondary schools with SEND pupils and their families to support successful transition. The SEMH and inclusion Team and AS are able to support the transition process for vulnerable pupils. The local secondary schools also offer support groups and holiday courses for vulnerable pupils to build confidence.

We welcome our youngest children into Nursery and Reception with stay and play sessions and home visits. We work closely with previous settings and the Child Development Centre (CDC) to ensure the best possible start to life at Owlsmoor for our youngest pupils.

## **Complaints**

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Parents or carers who have concerns relating to their child's SEND are welcome to discuss them with the class teacher, SENDCO, FSA or Headteacher who may be able to offer support or signpost where more advice may be available.

## **Further development**

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Our strategic plans for developing and enhancing SEND provision in our school this year include

continuing to look for ways to improve outcomes for our SEND pupils.

We wish to further develop our pastoral care with the continued provision of key adults to support pupil's academic, social and emotional development, by developing a Nurture Provision and through developing the partnership between home and school.

We are looking into purchasing some diagnostic resources to further improve early identification of needs.

In preparing this report we hope to include staff, parents and children through making it available on the school website and welcome any feedback comments.
