Attention Parents "Don't Think use Instinct" Our Perspective of Jenson's Recovery Journey has now launched on Amazon as of 31st March 2023

Since we have been part of Owlsmoor Primary School for the last eleven years. Jenson has spent five years regaining his strength from his brain tumour diagnosis back in 2017. There are days when you will see him in his walker, flying around the corner getting to his class or maybe looking tired after a long week at school. He loves to be part of school life. However, this was not an easy process to enable him to enjoy independence and learning at the same time. Our view Don't Think use Instinct, highlights the impact families face when one of their children faces a life changing diagnosis. Raising awareness of the symptoms, and how they can be easily missed, this could happen to someone or is happening to someone you know right now. Our mission as part of #TeamJenson, is to improve the quality of life of children and young adults that are managing physical barriers to learning and instil coping strategies to continue their development. This story gives a viewpoint from many directions not just from Jenson's but from us as parents. We hope to inspire others to change their perception of what they think of this condition as it is sadly increasing. Jenson is a true warrior; he is relentless and will stubbornly continue to work on himself. As he knows life can be fragile, and he wants to make the most of it, by dropping fear and stepping into courage. We hope to be able to arrange a time to speak within schools in the local area as this could help to save lives. Marble Mayhem

In March, we celebrated National Science Week with the theme 'Connections'. The children accepted the challenge of moving a marble from Early Years to Year 6, and back again, to 'connect' our school. The marble had to be moved using forces and was not allowed to be held by a human hand, or directly touch the floor. In Ostriches, the children made a huge marble run



spanning the whole classroom. The marble was then caught in a pot, attached to a parachute and dropped out of the window. The children from Kiwis class were waiting to collect the marble and they used a pulley system to lift the marble through a window into their classroom. Once inside, they used magnetism to pull the marble in a small train along a wooden track all the way to the Year 6 classrooms. Needless to say, they achieved their goal in impressive style. Wonderful Woodlice



We were very lucky to be visited by one of the science teachers from Sandhurst School in March. She ran workshops for the children linked to our science theme, 'Living Things'. The children were astonished when

she unpacked her bag to reveal a container of hundreds of woodlice!
They spent the session using woodlice choice chambers, designed to

demonstrate that damp is more important to woodlice than dark- they will accumulate in damp, bright places in preference to dark, dry places. The children learned that these simple reflex actions in animals help to increase their chances of survival.




Poetry Performers



We had such fun celebrating World Poetry Day. The children worked very hard to learn a class poem as well as how to 'perform' it to others, using tone, volume, actions and expression. Kiwis class learned the poem, 'Poetry Pie' and Ostriches class learned, 'Gran Can You Rap?' We then performed our poems to the children and staff in Year 6 and Year 3. The children were amazing and 'performed' their socks off!

Planet Protectors



World Earth Day was held on 21st April and the children discussed the very important themes of recycling and reusing. They also learned about the crucial role that bees play in our survival, through the pollination of plants. We spent the afternoon enjoying fun, practical activities, including: scattering seeds onto grass verges to attract insects; planting

seeds in planters made from unwanted items and making posters to display around the school. During break times and lunchtime, the children also used litter pickers to collect up any rubbish around the playground and field.



Super Cyclists

Over the last two weeks, the children have been brushing up their cycling skills with expert instructors from Avanti Cycling. All of the children who enrolled, had time to demonstrate their balance and coordination on the school playgrounds, and were shown how to maintain control of their bike with one hand while signalling with the other. Those children able to do the latter, were then taken in small groups to cycle around the roads in the local area. They had experience of cycling in traffic and were taught where to position their bike on the road when turning at junctions. The children thoroughly enjoyed the experience and we hope this opportunity will have given them the confidence to cycle on our local roads independently in the future.


Science News
